

## November 12<sup>th</sup>: We're Thoreau-ing a Party!

In honor of his birthday, a collaborative of organizations have invited each town in Massachusetts to host a community READ for the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Henry David Thoreau's birth. In the morning worship service, we sink into Thoreau's thoughts about transcendence and the connections we can make to the first of our Unitarian Universalist sources of faith "Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life" Later that day, we open our doors to the greater community with a "Thoreau Reads" gathering, including a round table discussion with scholar Mike Hyde, and a Walking with Thoreau outing.

## Social Action and Outreach

"Is my skin brown because I drink chocolate milk?" Children ask questions and are curious about racial differences. *Why Are All the Black Kids Sitting Together in the Cafeteria*? by Beverly Daniel Tatum is the topic for **a community discussion hosted by our Racial Justice Team, on Sunday afternoon,**  **November 5.** Participants are invited for refreshments at 3:30 p.m. followed by discussion from 4:00-5:30. Come and bring your friends.

Tatum's book, first published in 1977, has been updated and is even more relevant today as it explores issues of race and racism in our country. The book's title is based on some of the questions she has been asked over many years as a college professor and psychologist. *Join the conversation whether you've read the book or not,* as we touch on topics such as racial identity, how to be an ally to people of color, American values, parenting strategies, and affirmative action. Books will be available at Book Ends.

There is still time for YOU to make a difference on Criminal Justice Reform. A Comprehensive Criminal Justice Reform Bill, S.2170 has been reported out of the Judiciary Committee to the Senate, where it is likely to pass. UU Mass Action recommends we write our representatives in the House **by November 1**, to urge them to work for the same reforms. ## Something NEW at WUS Yoga!

Sample a Restorative Yoga class on Monday, November 20<sup>th</sup>, 2017. 6:30 - 8:00 pm - Meyer Chapel What is Restorative Yoga?

Restorative yoga is designed to relax the mind and open the body in a gentle way. Props are used in order to ensure comfort and support. If, while laying down in a spinal twist, for example, one's knees do not touch the ground, a pillow or cushion is placed under the knees to support them. Comfort is key! Restorative poses are typically held for 5-10 minutes, which is what it takes to get to a deep level of relaxation, of quieting the body, mind, and breath. It is common to fall asleep while in a restorative pose, which is part of the intention: to deeply relax the central nervous system and restore the body from everyday stress. Restorative yoga is accessible to all, even if you are overcoming an injury or a recent surgery.

We ask that everyone <u>bring a beach towel or blanket</u>, a mat and a pillow if you'd like.

Your previously purchased class card may be used, or pay the drop-in fee of \$15. If you have not yet attended yoga this Fall and would like to attend, or have any questions, please contact our teacher, <u>Jamie Sokolowski</u>, Certified Kripalu Yoga Instructor.

The Fall Gentle Kripalu flow yoga class continues through November 20<sup>th</sup>, the final class being the Sample Restorative Yoga class. Each class ends with a relaxation, allowing you to pause deeply before facing the coming week. Several payment

options are available: a 10-class card for \$130, a 5-class card for \$65 or drop-in for one class for \$15. The nonprofit organization's mission is to build and donate custom homes nationwide for severely injured post-9/11 Veterans. Homes For Our Troops (HFOT) <u>https://www.hfotusa.org</u> is a privately funded 501(c) (3) nonprofit organization that builds and donates specially adapted custom homes nationwide for severely injured post-9/11 Veterans, to enable them to rebuild their lives. Most of these Veterans have sustained injuries including multiple limb amputations, partial or full paralysis, and/or severe traumatic brain injury (TBI). These homes restore some of the freedom and independence the Veterans sacrificed while defending our country, and enable them to focus on their family, recovery, and rebuilding their lives. Since its inception in 2004, nearly 90 cents of every dollar has gone directly to program services for Veterans. HFOT builds these homes where the Veteran chooses to live, and continues its relationship with the Veterans after home delivery to assist them with rebuilding their lives <u>https://www.hfotusa.org</u>.

It's that time of year again to sign up for Thanksgiving food baskets to be collected for the Council of Social Concern in Woburn. Last year we committed to 30 baskets for the


