Last year for Earth Day we presented a new *Jazz Suite* that I wrote for the occasion. Given the digital medium we are using for our services it felt appropriate to reprise some selections from that Sunday. For *The Peace of Wild Things* and *Earth Dance* you will hear Lihi Haruvi on saxophone, Rick McLaughlin on bass, Brooke Sofferman on drums, and myself on piano. *The Peace of Wild Things* is a setting of the poem by Wendell Berry. The opening hymn *Our World* also comes from the suite.

I am dedicating the very beautiful *Consolation No. 3* to Linda Reck, who passed away this week from Covid 19. Linda was a beautiful spirit and wonderful musician who kept on singing until the very end. We will miss her charming personality and whimsical sense of humor.

The Green Sanctuary Committee would also like to share this article with you about The Global Environmental Recycling Crisis: [link]

Good morning families and friends,

Today's worship service is for Earth Day. Members of our Green Sanctuary group will be reflecting upon spiritual and activist connections to Earth on the 50th anniversary of the first Earth Day. If you have a chance, and time to watch with your children, look for some of the many videos that show animals coming into cities and parks and streets that humans have left during this time. What can we do today, and on the days that follow, to protect the life on our planet, and the resources which all living beings share?

There are coloring pages beyond these introductory pages, for meditative coloring (with thanks to Fritzie Nace for contributing several). What do you see, smell, feel that is of Earth in your immediate environment? An apple, potting soil?

I invite you to have manipulative play items as well as the resource pages attached here as the service unfolds. As with in sanctuary worship, your children will check in and out, and it bears repeating that attention on something else does not mean they are not taking in the service, or the elements appropriate to their age. If weather permits, invite them to look for signs of spring, either by going outside or from a window. Invite them to draw what they see, or to make a list.

We finish the day with the all-important ritual of snack or lunch. Breaking bread together is an important part of many religious observances. We can call it snack or fellowship, but it is a time to share food and enjoy the company of each other. This sharing deepens relationships. Enjoy. Enlist your children in creating snack or lunch. They are more likely to eat something they helped to make.

I will continue to include a description for the Settling In part of the morning which we use in Religious Education sessions. These are pinned to the top of this week's pages.

Before our Morning Begins You'll need your chalice, other candles for kindling the light, blank paper, things to color/draw with, and the pages attached. You can also add scissors, glue, ribbon and decorative cardstock* if you'd like to get working on a May basket sooner than May! Plain paper can also work, you can do your own decorating1

Settling in ritual and description (skip this part if you know it!)

- Entering –Ask everyone to "check in" with their name and something specific (an animal they like, favorite food etc.) This week I recommend "something I like about outside/nature". Even though you know each other, naming and responding is a way of bringing one's self into the present.
- Introduce and practice chime time signals: If you have a physical chime or bell, great, if not, there's an app for that. Ring the chime (or better still, have a child ring the chime). The set up goes something like this. "Relax, soften your gaze or close your eyes if you like. To soften your gaze, just look off in the distance at nothing in particular. I think you probably know how to close your eyes.

When the chime sounds, listen carefully to when the sound ends and the silence begins and when you hear that change, raise your hand or" (any signal you agree on).

• Introduce and practice Collective Breaths: We breathe together three times with a slow count inhale and a slow count exhale (I use a four count for each). Set up goes something like this "As with chime time, you can soften your gaze or close your eyes. If you like place a hand on your chest, over your heart and one on your belly so that can also feel the breath go in and out. Let us begin, 1, 2, 3, 4, and out, 1, 2, 3, 4. Again (repeat the sequence). And one last time (repeat the sequence)

Chalice Lighting: We do this collectively, online as our service begins






Saturday, May 2nd – – Search for 5 signs of Spring in Plants


