# WUSYG: Live to Give by Sam Wilson

Last month 12 youth and 4 of us adults spent the week living in southwestern Rhode

Island and working at various sites in the "Quiet Corner" of northwestern Connecticut. We stayed at a homestead whose mission is to "offer environmentally responsible hospitality to churches and nonprofit organizations seeking to make a positive impact in the world." They are an outdoor ministry of the United Church of Christ.

During the day we partnered with Community Kitchens, a locally-run organization that provides healthy and nutritious meals to all who come through their doors, 5 days a week at various sites in the area. Their mission:



being committed to improving the quality of life of those they serve, restoring their dignity, and working to end food insecurity in their community.

As per our own mission, we were there to be of service to them however they saw most fit, which included preparing meals, organizing pantries, and also working with their partners to clean up trash and help the community theater clear out their space. We also spent time learning about food insecurity, fostering connections with each other and our spirituality, and thinking about how this week might catalyze change in our lives and subsequently the world.



We are so grateful to the congregation for giving our youth the opportunity to go on this transformative trip. Also huge thanks to Roofus Hoffmann and Gordy McIntosh, our two volunteer chaperones.





I am also pleased to share that we have already decided to return to War, WV next year. This will be WUSYG's third trip there, working with an organization called Big Creek People in Action. They are a

community-led organization in one of the poorest regions in the country. We help them with various construction projects that people otherwise would not be able to afford or do themselves (for example, we have built handicap ramps and even set up plumbing for a family with a toddler who previously had no access to water in their home). Our rising seniors went there during their sophomore year and are particularly excited to return and do more for this wonderful organization and community.

**GA: Key Climate** 

and Investing Decisions Ahead

### Affiliated Community Minister

I am delighted that the congregation has voted to welcome me into the Winchester Unitarian Society as an affiliated community minister. I am looking forward to working with Rev. Heather and other leaders to begin putting plans into place for the coming program year.

I see many congregations speeding to the "finish line" of the program year, and (hopefully) heading to our UUA General Assembly where the participation of our congregational delegates is vital to the denomination's health and governance. I have a fond spot for GAs, as we call them.

Over the past ten years, my own GA experiences have been shaped largely by my role as a Board member of UU Ministry for Earth: supporting the workshops, spending time in the exhibit hall booth conversing with the curious, our supporters and allies. Add to that the thrill of worshipping *en masse* with UUs from around the country, learning new things and unlearning the unhelpful, and the pleasures of the chance encounters with old friends and acquaintances. Having served as a delegate from my home congregation in the past, I know the importance of taking up the most pressing concerns of the times and serving as a bridge to bring it all "home" to my congregation.

This year, I wear neither the UUMFE nor the congregational delegate hat. I'm not obligated to attend, but I want to go! So much is happening ... Article 2, the presidential election and transition. A visit to my home state!

#### My personal interest in this

year's GA is especially piqued by the excitement, concerns and discussions generated by a proposed business resolution put forth by a group of UU young adults, "<u>Complete Divestment from the Fossil Fuel Industry and</u> <u>Subsequent Reparations</u>." The resolution calls for a more complete divestment of the UU Common Endowment Fund (UUCEF), no longer holding fossil fuel shares for the purpose of shareholder advocacy, and making plans to redistribute the fossil-fueled wealth generated.

For context, you may know that this GA marks the ninth anniversary of the passage of the 2014 Business Resolution calling for Fossil Fuel Divestment. At the time, this was ground-breaking news in the faith community as the UUA, along with other progressive faiths, began aligning their investments with their values more rigorously in response to the climate crisis. Another UUMFE Board member and I worked closely with the UUA's Socially Responsible Investment Committee and Treasurer to craft and bring that resolution forward and engaged congregations to support it. It was a long and careful process. I often hesitate to get up to speak in front of hundreds

of people, but this issue, those times and the "Pro" mic called to me! (UUWorld article here)

Today's young adults seem to me to be saying the spirit and the letter of that law have been forgotten or ignored, judging from the rather damning litany of fossil fuel shares held by the UUCEF included in this business resolution. How did this happen after the initial years of compliance? I don't know! Clearly, a course correction is called for and, apparently, according to the UUA Treasurer, is partly under way.

The UUA Treasurer has shared his analysis of the operational and financial impacts of the proposed resolution in his <u>UUA Treasurer's memo to the</u> <u>UUA Board of Trustees</u>. Taking these points into consideration, the UUA Board has released its <u>statement opposing the resolution</u>.

I'm curious to see how this plays out at GA. How do we have the conversations that move our highest, most idealistic aspirations towards the actionable and pragmatic? How far can we live into our values when our own funds and sustainability are at stake?

Ella will write a reflective essay about her experiences at WUS. Rev. Heather will serve as her overall supervisor and Richard Dorbin will supervise Ella when Rev. Heather is away for vacation and study leave. This internship is funded by an outside grant through Wellesley College.

Here are a few words from Ella: I'm a third-year student at Wellesley College studying gender and sexuality in religion. I was born and raised in Durham, NC, where my beautifully blended family still resides, including four parents, four siblings, four cats, and a dog. While I did not grow up in any particular faith tradition, I attended the Eno River Unitarian Universalist Fellowship (ERUUF) for a year and the

experience stayed with me.

So it felt like kismet when my first-year Residential Advisor at Wellesley was the President of Heartspace, the UU campus ministry group. I initially joined Heartspace as a favor to her, but quickly fell in love with the community. I became more involved over time and am now President of the group. Aside from Heartspace, I am also a Sexual Health Educator (SHE) on

campus, an Administrative Assistant in the Religion Department, an avid romance novel reader, and an aspiring embroiderer.

I am thrilled to be interning at WUS this summer and can't wait to get started!
