The anthem this morning asks the pertinent question, "How Long 'til this world is free from suffering? 'Til the power of love will come and heaven's will is done." A beautifully crafted work by the contemporary composer Pepper Choplin. ♦ For the Kindling music, we hear another selection from Dett's *8 Bible Vignettes* - this one an imagined setting of Psalm 23. ♦ The Offertory is a profound setting of the Langston Hughes poem *Litany*, a true cry for the power of Liberating Love: "Gather up In the arms of your pity The sick, the depraved, The desperate, the tired, All the scum Of our weary city.
