#### **Music Notes:**

This morning we bear witness to the African-American spirituals and all the pain, struggle and beauty from which they originate. Our hymnal documents the time of their creation spanning approximately 1750-1875. Indeed, they were passed down through the generations and little is known of their origins. We do know they were eventually written down and began to be published in the 1860s. Following the Civil War, the singing of the spirituals moved to the concert stage as groups like the Fisk Jubilee Singers toured the world. It is in this tradition of concert Spiritual with intricately composed arrangements that we meet this music. One of the early arrangers, William Dawson (1899-1990) not only arranged many spirituals but wrote many large concert works, including his Negro Folk Symphony in 1934. Subsequent generations have continued this tradition including Moses Hogan (1957-2003), Dr. André Thomas (b.1952), and Rollo Dilworth (b.1970). Other arrangers this morning include the English composer Samuel Coleridge Taylor (1875-1912) whose father was from Sierra Leone and the American composers Jack Halloran (1916-1997) and Adolphus Hailstork (b.1941).
